She will stay on as president emeritus and continue to research, write scripts, and oversee production of new videos for the Foundation, according to a release sent out by Jeff Hartman, executive vice president of the organization.

It has become clear Veteran Affairs (VA) hospitals have had a hard time treating the number of veterans who need care. There's a simple way to help address this problem and it doesn't require any new hiring: Make better use of the skills and experience of the health care professionals working at the VA.

It is exactly what

the Veterans' Health Administration (VHA) is considering with Advanced Practice Registered Nurses (APRNs). These women and men compassionate professionals with advanced degrees and the clinical experience necessary to provide a wider range of care than the VHA allows.

Right now, APRNs have full practice authority when treating active duty military Department of Defense. Their skills are put to good use for the DoD, especially on the front lines of U.S. military actions, and they should be granted the same authority to serve our veterans to the best of their abilities in the VHA.

There are already several thousand APRNs serving in veterans' hospitals. Let's use them more efficiently and effectively to allow

them to offer veterans a wider range of care.

As a veteran, I'm glad to see that a solution to the long wait times veterans face could be coming in the near future. I urge our elected officials in Illinois and in Congress to support the agency in its common sense move.
